

I used this book on a trip to Venice from which I returned 10/25/14. I found the book to need serious editing and updating. I did the Introducing Venice on Foot in one day the first day and found that just by following signs that read Per S. Marco leaving the train station and signs that read Per Ferrovia to return, I could do the walk without the book. Or follow the crowds. Or stay on the widest streets.

In following days I did Salute, Accademia and Zattere: Eastern Dorsoduro and the Miracle Church: Gesuti to Santa Giovanni e Paolo in reverse. On p20 (Salute) the author describes the plague statuary as a painting. C'mon! On pages 23 and 24, Faggiotto and Cantinone Schiavi are no longer in business. In Miracle Church), Paulo Olbi (p90) is no longer in business. I was then gladdened to see that Trattoria Storica (p89) and Osteria Boccadoro (p90) were. It would have been very helpful if site descriptions other than of churches, say, had the house numbers in parentheses. That being said, Venice is a wonderful place to walk with literally a surprise around every corner.

Unfortunately, it has one serious flaw that diminishes its usability. It lacks a single map that shows *all* of the tours. So when you finish one tour and are looking for a nearby one, there's very little help. I could have planned my walking days much better if I simply had the map that shows all of the tours.
