

# **Synopsis**

In the vivid and outlandish tradition of Hunter S. Thompson, journalist Michael Swindle shares his most bizarre, laugh out loud accounts of his travels: cockfights in Cajun country and wild boar hunts in the Everglades; "hog dog" rodeo in northern Louisiana and ass-hauling alligators in southern Louisiana; state to state fish throws in Florida to Alabama; and hollerin' contests in North Carolina. Other pieces explore a Haitian military dictatorship involved in voodoo and a story that starts with a Zapatista march on Mexico City and ends with an Anahuac Indian New Year's ceremony for the year 5722. Always entertaining, Swindle has a gift for bringing to life a folksy array of coastal characters, and shows a willingness to unflinchingly examine some controversial subject matter as well.

Michael Swindle is an author, freelance writer, poet, actor, art curator, and aficionado of the chile picante. His feature articles and reviews have appeared in numerous national magazines and

Born in Alabama, and raised there and in Mississippi, he now lives and works in New Orleans.

I just discovered Michael Swindle's Slouching Towards Birmingham. I was raised in Birmingham, Alabama, so parts of this book were somewhat nostalgic for me. It is kind of a "coming of (middle) age" epic. Swindle sets out to do all the things and see all the places he missed, or maybe just passed up, in his sometimes misspent youth. One of the most charming things about all these tales is his love and respect for the people he meets. Without exception, he accepts them as they are, and leaps right in with them in whatever adventure awaits. His tales have a Plimptonesque feel. Ever wonder what it's like to hunt wild boars in the Florida swamps? He wondered. Now he knows. Now I do too! Through Swindle's telling, I not only "saw" Yella, the old hog-hunting hound, I heard him, and might have even petted him. I dragged my tired, aching, sleep-deprived, foggy-brained ass through that godforsaken hog farm with them. Swindle's easy, yet vivid descriptions, put me directly into the swamps and bayous of Louisiana, the backwoods of Mississippi, the NASCAR races of North Carolina, and the Florida Everglades. In each of his vignettes, the scene is so richly described I ould not only see, but feel it. From the auction-like roar of the Cormier's Cockpit "croupier" to the serenity of the Mississippi lakes, he swept me into the action, so I was no longer a voyeur, but a participant. Each story brought the thought to me, "This is my favorite!" In the end, I can't choose one. I'm exhausted, though. I've wrestled alligators, hunted wild boars, partied at NASCAR races, revisited Legion Field in Birmingham, AL for the legendary Alabama/Auburn football competition, and finally nestled in Gene Crutcher's Bookstore basement again, where Gene introduced me to probably the same books to which he introduced Michael Swindle. One of the most enjoyable aspects of reading these stories is the dry humor. Written in easy conversational tone, it's like I'm listening to him tell the stories, and smiling throughout. My cheeks were sore when I finished. I feel like I know Michael Swindle; like I just had a long conversation with him. So how can I summarize? Nostalgic, fun, adventurous, funny, picturesque, parade of real people, a treasure of Americana... is a start.
