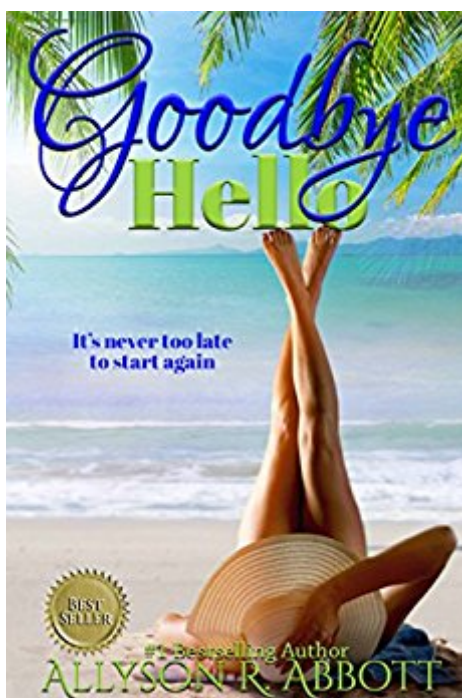

I'll be honest; I was pleasantly surprised by Goodbye, Hello. It's a great new coming of age novella that just about anyone can relate to. I think the themes and plot of this story are the reason I liked it so much. Even though I'm not the same age as Linda, her story is just so relatable. She realizes that she is unhappy with her life and has been for a while. Her deceased husband is still controlling her life, which depresses her and enforces just how unhappy she is. Realizing it's not too late, she vows to make and follow through with her own plans for her future. Through her journey, she learns who she actually is, what she stands for, and what she wants her life to be. She doesn't just wake up a new woman, which shows the struggle that many people go through. Wanting a new life is different from actually creating a new one. Changing takes time for everyone, just as it does for Linda. She's bitter and grieving, and it takes her some time to let go of her past.
