


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Wild And Precious Life

The strength these two women have exhibited is beyond human comprehension. It's incredible how they can take tragedy and turn that into

something meaningful with the dying with dignity cause. Deb is a very good writer, her words flow from the heart and you will not be able to put this book down.

This book is beautifully written and holds your interest throughout. I know this was a very, very personal story for Deborah to write, but I wonder if she might be a future famous author. I'd love to read something else she has written. I particularly liked her writing about locations and scenes such as Washington State and Machu Picchu; it made me want to visit these locations.

Wild and Precious Life by Deborah Ziegler is a cross between a Nicholas Sparks novel and Beaches, except that it is non fiction. This is a beautifully written love story by a mother to her wild and precious daughter, Brittany Maynard. Twenty-nine year old Brittany is diagnosed with a fatal and inoperable brain tumor and this is the story of how Brittany and her mother start a journey of how to die with dignity. It is a treacherous journey on how to deal with the tumor, how to say goodbye, how to deal with death while how to still live life to the fullest. It is the story of how Brittany takes back control of her life with the help of her mother, Deborah. In choosing to die on her terms, Brittany is able to live life on her terms. It is the story of how a fatal illness rips a family apart and then at the end, brings them back together. In her mother's words, Brittany lived more in her twenty-nine years than most people live in 90 years. "Promise me you won't let me suffer, momma.", Brittany pleads, while her momma promises, "I will not let this tumor torture you. I will do whatever I have to do." And so she did. They moved to Oregon where the Death with Dignity law was already in existence. This is the story of a journey: a journey of trips, a journey of advocating for a child, of advocating for others, and of finding and repairing the relationship between a mother and a daughter that at one point was broken. Brittany died on a date of her choosing, surrounded by her loved ones, resting her head on her mother's chest while her mom read her poetry. This book reads like poetry and thanks to Brittany and Deborah, several states now offer the choice to terminally ill people on how they wish to die. Deborah kept her promise to her Mary Poppins loving Sweet Pea: She did whatever it took to not let that tumor take away what her daughter held most dear: control over her body. Together in life as in death, Brittany and Deborah are a force to be reckoned with. This has major motion picture written all over it.

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
