


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Backroads Of Texas: Along The Byways To Breathtaking Landscapes And Quirky Small Towns

It was interesting to read how many of the towns got their names. â ÂœIn 1906, three land promoters with the last names Balcom, Morrow, and Rhea established the town of Balmorhea. â Â• Read the book to find out how the locals pronounce the names of the towns such as Boerne, Gruene and Refugio. The publisher did an amazing job of weaving the photos, sidebars and text into a beautiful, easy to read layout with sharp and colorful renditions of the photos.
