


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Inca Footprints: Complete Guide To Cusco And The Sacred Valley Of Peru

Embarassing to compare Brien Foerster to the native guides. They want to take you on the touristy beaten paths like Machu Pichau. Brien can match their knowledge on the beaten paths around Cuzco but where he separates himself from the native guides or "guias" is the off-beat, the untrodden paths. Maybe some of them know of these places also, and don't want to make that kind of effort ? Brien does it all and tells you about these places in this book. It was my hand guide in Peru (and I did not have to pay Brien his \$6K package fee.) Sorry Brien,but you are truly the best. When in Peru with this book, think Pre-Deluvian. (pre-flood, pre apocalypse) Also see Dr. Robt Schoch's book on ice core drillings in the north pole (what's left of the north pole) and begin to learn

what happened to this planet 12,500 years ago. We chose this book mostly because it was available on the kindle store. The book is packed with typos, that make its reading unpleasant. But that is not the major problem. The author keeps on writing that the official explanation is too simple, and therefore there must be another one, more "intriguing" that should be more appropriate. Clearly the author is not aware of Occam's razor :). Official theories and academic publications are sloppily liquidated while Graham Hancock is uncritically cited as an independent researcher. It reminds me reading one of those conspiracy theories books, more than an historical/touristic book.Nevertheless, it is not a useless book. For many of the Cuzco sites (for the 50% of the book that I have read), also the official theory is reported. Alone it is not enough to substitute a local guide.

I bought this and read it on the plane ride to Peru. I loved it. To say that Mr. Foerster is quite knowledgeable on this subject is a serious understatement. He really knows his stuff and will tell you all the stuff the guides won't. All Peruvian guides go to the same school and they all spout the same non-sense they have been told to say. Do yourself a favor and read this and all of Mr. Foerster's books either before you go or while you are on your way to Peru. You will love the trip. Definitely amazing place. The information in this book is essential. I had the absolute pleasure of meeting Brien Foerster on my way to the Ballestas Islands. Look him up. Definitely worth your time.
