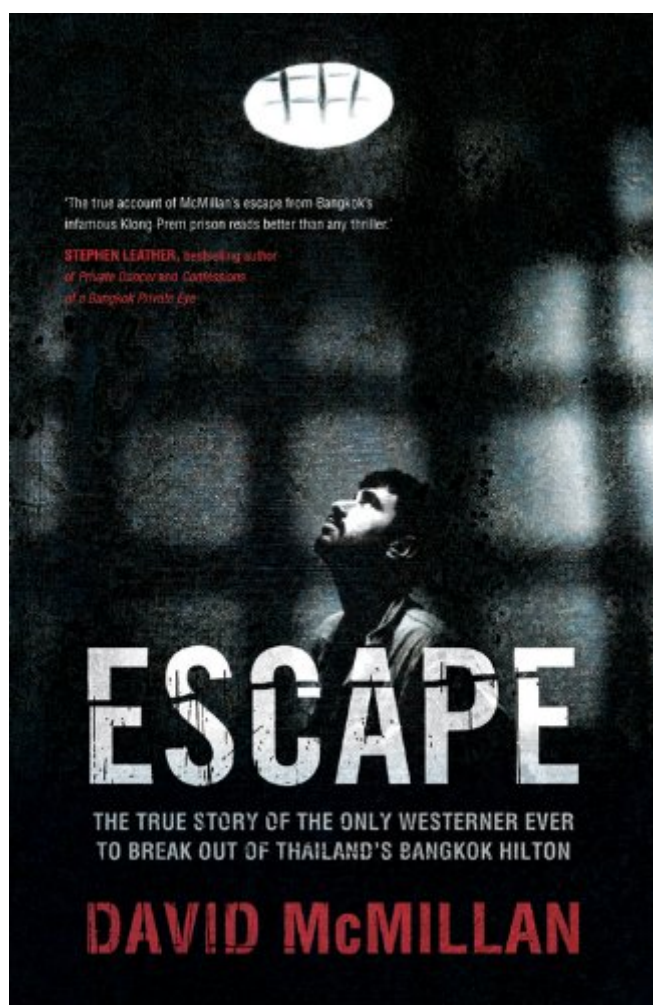

Buy this. Great insights into the highs and lows of the drugs trade and the unfortunates who are deluded into smuggling drugs into countries where the price of being caught is the death penalty. Most are unfortunate dorks of the highest echelon and those from Third World countries are especially sad. Then there are the people on the top of the drug trade food chain like the author. Clever, literate, articulate and brave. His escape from the Bangkok Hilton makes the crash-out from Stalag Luft III look like a jolly walk in the park especially as the price of being caught doesn't bear thinking about. Moreover, his Jack-the-Lad machinations on the inside, his connections on the outside, the support he received both in prison and outside on the lam, with food,

safe houses, false passports, visas, credit cards etc., are revealing. He seems to have been very successful and accumulated lots of dosh. However, the overall message is simply: DON'T!

"Escape" is a completely unjudgmental story about the escape of a cocaine smuggler from a high security prison in Thailand, that is told with no lean towards any kind of excuse for the use and smuggling of cocaine. There is plenty of food for thought regarding the usefulness of prisons. The mentality of the kind of people who get involved in crime and whether the kind of prison that is described is in any way a solution to the social problem of drugs and crime as we are led to see it today. Do we perhaps need a complete change of vision on the whole idea of crime? On the whole idea of drugs being illegal? After all alcohol is not illegal, cigarettes are not illegal, but both of them play a devastating role in destroying the lives of many people. How many lives are saved by putting drug smugglers into prison? More or less that if the drugs were legal and controlled by governments or the national health services, or some other body? Not an easy question to answer but nevertheless a question that needs to be tackled better than now.

This is a very well written book, the author is arrested in Thailand for an offence that he has not guilty of (this time) and when faced with a long sentence and a justice system he has no faith in, he took the brave step to try and escape. It was brave because in Thailand there is no second chance at escape, you are either killed or you are beaten so badly that you will never be able to try and escape again. The author was a self confessed drug dealer and expects no pity for ending up in jail, he saw jail as an occupational hazard as one in his profession must learn to do. His superb understanding of "the Thai way" enabled him to succeed where many others have failed. Sadly for David he has ended up in Jail again since publishing this book, though to his credit he never suggested that he was going to retire and go straight. It's sad because he's clearly a very bright chap who could make a challenging career from something less risky, but I think it's the risk that drives him as much as anything.
